Question for a Charter Amendment: Use Ranked Choice Voting in Kansas City Municipal Elections

Kansas City, Missouri shall adopt ranked choice voting as the method for electing the Mayor and City Council Members, without a separate primary election, with ballot format and rules for counting votes to be adopted by ordinance.

It is unlawful for anyone to sign any petition with any name other than his or her own, or knowingly to sign his or her name more than once for the same measure for the same election, or to sign a petition when he or she knows he or she is not a registered voter, or to encourage another to do so.

Savings: The cost of the June, 2019 election was about \$617,000, so eliminating the second election would save around that much money. This savings will come every four years.

Cost of equipment and software: The City already owns these, so there is no added cost. A small amount may be needed for training of election officials and fine-tuning of software.

- (1) *Multiple pages.* Signatures to a nominating petition need not all be appended to one page, but each separate page must have an affidavit of the circulator stating that each signature was made in the circulator's presence and is the genuine signature of the person whose name it purports to be.
- (2) *Required information.* Each signer of a petition shall sign his or her name in ink or indelible pencil, and designate his or her residence by street and number, or other description sufficient to identify the place. Printed or typed names of each signer shall be included in each petition.
- (3) *No embellishment of nominating petition.* A nominating petition shall not include any political party or other designation.
- (4) *Form of petition.* The City Clerk shall provide form nominating petition papers.
- (5) *Verification of signatures.* If necessary, no later than the Thursday following the close of the filing period the City Clerk will distribute nominating petitions to the appropriate election authorities for verification of signatures. Election authorities will return to the City Clerk nominating petitions showing valid and invalid signatures with a count of valid signatures.

- (1) *Determination of signature threshold.* The City Clerk will total the number of valid signatures reported by each election authority for each person to determine compliance with the requirement for valid signatures. Ranked choice voting is a voting method in which voters rank their candidate preferences on one ballot. Until a candidate receives a majority of highest-choice preferences, then the candidate receiving the fewest highest-choice preferences is eliminated and the next highest-choice preferences for that candidate are counted for the remaining candidates. An election is declared for the candidate who first receives a majority of highest-choice preferences of remaining candidates.
- (3) In case of the death, withdrawal, or disqualification of any candidate, that candidate is excluded from the counting of preferences and subsequent vote tallies.

Financial Impact

Savings: The cost of the June, 2019 election was about \$617,000, so eliminating the second election would save around that much money. This savings will come every four years.
