

KC should invest in building a robust system of public health infrastructure that has the necessary funding for the local health department and safety net clinics, focusing on prevention and strategically protecting and promoting the health of all community members, especially in our lowest life expectancy zip codes.	All people in Kansas City should have fair and affordable access to safe, healthy, and dignified housing.	All students in KCMO, beginning as young as possible, should receive equitable education, trauma-informed support, and constructive interactions from teachers and school staff that prepares them for success in life by having access to opportunities inside and outside of the classroom.	All individuals should have access to quality, affordable healthcare, Medicaid expansion should be implemented across all service providers in ways that ensure those who need it most have equitable and abundant access, with no barriers, to Medicaid resources to keep themselves and their families safe and healthy.	KC leadership's priority should be a violence-free community that ensures necessary funding and support for coordinated, evidence-based approaches, community-level initiatives, and systems-level changes that directly address and eliminate discrimination and bias while advancing equitable policies and practices to provide safe and healthy communities for all. Implementation of the KC-CHIP

- Assess current and identify additional partners and institutions needed to implement the CHIP
- Increase the community representativeness of the CHIP Committee
- Establish the ongoing purpose and activities of the CHIP Committee, meeting at least once quarterly during CHIP implementation or more frequently during future CHIP development.
- Ensure the policies/practices outlined in the CHIP are being moved into existence and work through the Health Commission and its Committees to hold City leadership, Kansas City institutions, and decision-makers accountable.
- Garner funding through Health Commission partners to hire an independent project management contractor to provide support for effective, consistent, and ongoing CHIP implementation with the Health Commission, its Committees, institutional partners, and the community
