The Need & Opportunity

- According to KCPD, Kansas City, Missouri had 657 homicides from 2019 to 2022, annually averaging 164 homicides. There has been a 35 percent increase from the prior 5-year period (122 annual average homicides from 2014 to 2018).
- Fatal and nonfatal shootings increase in the summer months, typically double the monthly average when compared with the rest of the year.
- When youth reach the 14-18 years old age group, we begin to see them directly impacted by firearm violence.
- Last year, summer 2022, twelve youth-serving nonprofit organizations served 604 Kansas City, Missouri youth. This project provides the opportunity to significantly expand the number of youth served during the summer months.



The KC Blueprint for Violence Prevention and a Safe and Healthy Community

- The KC Blueprint was adopted in 2020 by City Council.
- City Council voted to allocate funds to support KC Blueprint strategies in March 2023.
- KCHD asks that \$550,000 be awarded to KC Common Good for the Supporting Families Through Summer Opportunities for Youth project.





Contract Details



- One year of funding with the option to renew every year for up to four years.
- Contract will support the activity of twelve youth-serving nonprofits.
- Contract will also allow for parents to send their children to summer programs of their choosing.





Vision:

Addressing the root causes of violence to instill hope and ensure a successful future for every person in the greater Kansas City region.

Mission:

Create an environment where all citizens can live safely and have access to real opportunities.



KC Common Good is addressing the root causes of violence by employing a collective impact model. We convene organizations to work together or in alignment to build a healthy, thriving Kansas City. This proven approach has decreased homicide rates and gun violence in cities across the nation.

Root causes of violence in Kansas City:

- Lack of access to resources
- Repeated family trauma
- Concentrated poverty
- High unemployment rate
- High school dropout rate

Our work aims to address these causes, build career and education pathways and provide proactive and responsive community support.

Statistics of black families in Omaha from 2008-2019

Families in poverty **DECREASED** from 31% to 22%

Unemployment **DECREASED** from 21% to 7.5%

Graduation rate INCREASED to 81% from 61%

Gun violence **DECREASED** by 74%




Economic Impacts of Violence


- Prevention is less costly than expenditures on law enforcement, prosecution, and corrections to address the serious issues after they occur.
- Outside of the financial impacts, we reduce the number of people victimized and build community capacity.
- To the right is a very simple calculation based on a very conservative success rate (5%) and only counting homicides, not other societal costs.
- Source for calculation is from: Abt, Thomas. *Bleeding out.* NY: Basic Books (2019)
- Simply stated:
 - If we save 39 lives (homicides to 132) the value is \$304M.
 - If we drop homicides in 1/2 (85) value is \$680M.


