Executive Summary

The City will be paying \$120,000.00 to settle a trip and fall claim brought by Jeffrey Martin.

Discussion

This was a trip and fall on City-owned risers at Municipal Auditorium. The claimant's foot caught on a detached strip of metal which caused him to fall forward. The handrail was also loose which prevented the claimant from catching himself. Mr. Martin suffered right distal bicep tendon rupture, muscle wasting and atrophy in his right upper arm, neck pain, right elbow pain, and carpal tunnel syndrome and required surgery and physical therapy. The City has a duty to maintain its property in a safe condition. Missouri Courts have held that cities are liable in similar cases.
